## Glen Allen My Community, Part 7:

Near the bridge where Mountain Road crosses the Chickahominy River was the "Chickahominy Tavern" later called "Child's Inn". It was built of brick and had 23 rooms. The only person of note "known" to stop there. That one was Jenny Lind during her last tour of America in 1851. A very old resident, Mrs. Imogene Holladay, remembers an amusing incident connected with Jenny Lind's visit at the tavern. A negro cook, employed in the home of Mrs. Williamson (grandmother of Mrs. Holladay), gave birth to twins that night and named them Jenny and Lind.

Another noted tavern, "Walkerton Tavern", and dwelling house were built by John Walker, an Englishman who came to America and acquired a large track of land on each side of Mountain Road. The tavern is still standing on the north side of the road just east of the station. The situation of the old bar and the window where drinks were served can still be seen. On the second floor is the ballroom, one side swings out to enlarge it. In the cellar is a huge fireplace with its crane, pots and kettles was where all the cooking was done. There was a wine cellar and three houses served to refresh guests. In the rear was a barn and stable to accommodate 20 horses and the stage coaches. The passengers alighted out on Mountain Road at a point just between the center cedars where a plank walkway led up to the winding steps. In 1852 this tavern was bought by the widow of Dr. George North Hopkins. The Dr. Hopkins was the grandfather of the late Dr. Erasmus Guy Hopkins who was one of the leading pathologists of the South. It has been used as the residence for the Hopkins for 75 years. The old bar and stable were burned in 1908. The other house was on the Southside of Mountain Road and used as Mr. Walker's dwelling. Both of the houses were made of brick and were similar in type. The furniture and most of the building materials were shipped from England. The dwellings of the house was bought by Colonel Thomas Burton a man of culture and wealth and used as his residence until he died in 1861. It was then occupied by A. P. Rowe (member of the House of Delegates and afterwards



About 3 miles westward from the station and South of the Mountain Road was Springfield Farm, containing mineral and sulphur springs of great medical value. About 100 years ago the father of Colonel Burton built here a resort consisting of a large hotel and cottages where the wealthy and fashionable people of Richmond spent the summer. This was sold to northern capitalists. In the same section of what is now "Francis Town", there were coal fields owned by Colonel Thomas Burton. The coal was hauled to Richmond in carts before the old Coal Pit Railroad was built prior to the Civil War.
